To help you all prepare for the Mentor-Mentee Speed Networking Zoom next **Thursday, October 7**, here are some networking tips and resources:

- TIP 1: Craft the story of you
 - Oftentimes when you are meeting someone in speed networking event (like our Zoom or even a career fair), you will need to have your "elevator pitch" ready. Your goal should be to get across what your interests are, what your aspirations are, and why you want to connect with the person you are speaking to.
- TIP 2: Find common ground
 - It can be easier and feel more natural to connect with someone when you both have found some common ground. Sometimes this common ground could simply be that you are interested in the field the other person is in. Or it could be that you both played a specific sport, or were in the same university organization. You can mention a bit of your background (hometown, what led you to where you are now) when you craft your story, and that may bring up areas of common ground!
- TIP 3: Focus on building a relationship, not a future job
 - Don't enter a networking event with the mindset of trying to find a
 job or internship. Use this opportunity to fully connect with the other
 individual you are talking to. Approach the conversation as a

field; you can find a lot of valuable advice from them if you focus on asking for their story rather than just about professional opportunities.
